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Avian Influenza (HPAI) Notices:

Due to the continuing US outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in domesticated and wild birds and in dairy cattle, Animal Health Officials from all six New England States are united in advising the following for agricultural fairs, competitions, exhibitions, shows, swaps, or other in-person events that encourage the gathering or co-mingling of birds and/or cattle:

Avian species

The New England State Veterinarians strongly discourage the exhibition of domestic and wild waterfowl species and may recommend delaying or canceling domestic fowl or poultry shows. If events are held, best practices for biosecurity should be implemented. Waterfowl exhibitions are currently banned in MA through April 30, 2026, which may be extended.

Bovine species

The New England State Veterinarians strongly discourage the exhibition of any bovines, including both dairy and beef cattle, that have been present in any state at the time that state had a current outbreak of HPAI in cattle. Bovines that have been shipped from currently affected states in 2026 should not be allowed on the premises of New England fairs or shows. Moving to or from an affected state for any reason will void any New England Fair and Show Season Official Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (OCVIs) that have been issued for such cattle for the remainder of the 2026 season.

The USDA APHIS Veterinary Services Federal Order Requiring Testing for and Reporting of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in Livestock issued on April 24, 2024, remains in effect. It can be found on the USDA website: www.aphis.usda.gov/sites/default/files/dairy-federal-order.pdf

General Rules for All Animals:

See M.G.L. c, 128 §2C, 129 §2

Continue to next sections for additional, specific rules for Cattle, Poultry, Goats, Camelids, Swine, Sheep, Equines, Rabbits, and Dogs and Cats.

1. All animals must be:
 - a. In proper physical condition
 - b. Properly identified
 - c. Free of visual evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease at time of arrival
 - a. Animals of any species with open or draining wounds will not be approved for entry.

2. An animal will be rejected from entry if:
 - a. There is evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease or open or draining wounds
 - b. Failure to produce the necessary documents for certification, vaccination, or testing
 - c. **THE INSPECTOR'S DECISION IS FINAL**
3. Any surgical procedure or injection of foreign substance or drug, or the application of any substance which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance is prohibited.
 - a. Irritants, counterirritants, or similar substances that affect the animal's performance, contour, conformation, or appearance is prohibited.
 - b. Exceptions include:
 - a. External applications of substances to the hooves or horns of animals that affect appearance only are permitted.
 - b. Surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the animal are permitted.
4. Official Identification (ID):
 - a. All livestock must have proper official, individual ID as required and approved by the USDA and accepted by the fair or show for the species such as official metal ear tags, tattoos, scrapie tags, or microchips.
 - b. Registration forms must accompany health certificates when used as part of official identification, e.g. with breed registry tattoos or microchips.
5. **Health Certificates: New England Animals Showing in New England States**
 - a. One Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) may be allowed for animals of the same species to be exhibited at fairs or shows in any of the New England States when submitted with an itinerary of the dates and locations of the events at which the listed animals are expected to be shown. Only animals that are healthy at the time of shipment may be moved.
 - b. For the 2026 Show and Fair season, OCVIs being used for the full season must meet all the requirements detailed in the 2026 New England Fairs and Shows memo issued jointly by the state veterinarians of CT, ME, MA, NH, RI, and VT (attached at the end of this document). This memo may be updated at any time during the fair season in response to animal health outbreaks.
6. **Health Certificates: General Rules for All Animals**
 - a. Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one health certificate with appropriate individual IDs and descriptions. Animals of different species may not be listed on the same official health certificate.
 - b. An itinerary of the names and locations of each New England fair or show at which the owner expects to show the listed animals and the dates when each animal is expected to be on each site must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time of the OCVI is written.
 - a. A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the official health certificate (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show.
 - b. That proposed list should be signed by the veterinarian and the owner/exhibitor and reference the relevant OCVI number(s).

- c. The name and address of the first show or fair where the listed animal will be exhibited is to be used as the “destination” on the OCVI form.
 - a. “See attached list” or similar statement directing Animal Health Official or Fair Inspectors to the attached proposed itinerary must be included.
- d. Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were present on show or fairgrounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check-in.
- e. Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home. If the animal is refused entry to any exhibition during 2026 for health reasons, it must have a new health certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of the next interstate movement.
- f. Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

Cattle Specific Information

See M.G.L c. 129 §§2, 39 and 330 CMR 4.04(2).

Bovine species- Special Notice 2026

The New England State Veterinarians strongly discourage the exhibition of any bovines, including both dairy and beef cattle, that have been present in any state at the time that state had a current outbreak of HPAI in cattle. Bovines that have been shipped from currently affected states in 2026 should not be allowed on the premises of New England fairs or shows. Moving to or from an affected state for any reason will void any New England Fair and Show Season Official Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (OCVIs) that have been issued for such cattle for the remainder of the 2026 season.

A plan for managing lactating dairy cattle (LDC), including the handling of milk collected at the exhibition facility, should be in place for all fairs and shows where LDC will be on the premises.

1. Tuberculosis (TB) and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States (which can be found at <https://www.aphis.usda.gov/livestock-poultry-disease/status-eradication-programs>) and from in-state animals. If the exhibitor’s state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795 or 857-348-3922). All animals must be free of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, cowpox, and open or draining wounds.
2. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all cattle be currently vaccinated against rabies.

3. Note: The Big E is requiring RFID official identification tags for all cattle entering The Big E Fairgrounds premises in 2026. Other fairs may add this requirement. Contact the fair office with questions.

Poultry Specific Information

See M. G. L. c. §§2, 129, and 330 CMR 5.02

Important: *Waterfowl may not be exhibited, shown, or otherwise gathered or co-mingled at in-person events in Massachusetts until April 30, 2026, unless extended by the Director of Animal Health, per MDAR Order 1-17-AHO-25.*

1. No poultry will be admitted to a fairground until it has been individually inspected.
2. All poultry must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: infectious bronchitis, coryza, pullorum-typhoid, fowl-pox, external parasites, and laryngotracheitis.
3. Each bird must be accompanied by written proof (ID card or test report) that the breeding flock was blood-tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within one year prior to entry date.
4. Birds from quarantined states will not be permitted entry.
5. All birds over 16 weeks of age as of January 1, 2026, shall be individually leg banded with a state leg band. This includes out-of-state exhibitors.
6. No bird vaccinated for laryngotracheitis within thirty (30) days of the fair will be admitted.

Goat Specific Information

See M. G. L. c. 129 §§2, 9 CFR 79.6 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

1. Tuberculosis (TB) and brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States (<https://www.aphis.usda.gov/livestock-poultry-disease/status-eradication-programs>) and in-state animals being exhibited in MA.
2. All goats and kids presented, regardless of age, must be individually listed and identified on the health certificate.
3. All goats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions:
 - a. Foot rot, mage, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox, and open or draining wounds.
 - b. All goats must also be free of soremouth and scrapie exposure.
4. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to a show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHP-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363-2290.

Camelid Specific information

See M.G.L. c. 129 §2, M.G.I. c. 131, §23, 321 CMR 9.02.

1. Tuberculosis (TB) and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and from in-state animals. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795 or 857-348-3922).

Swine Specific Information

See M.G.L. c. 129 §14E, 330 CME 11.4(2). 9 CFR 71.19

1. All swine must be identified by an official ear tag or registration.
2. Swine must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, mange, and open or draining wounds.
3. Exhibited swine may not have been fed raw garbage.
4. No person shall import into Massachusetts from outside the state any swine which have been pseudorabies vaccinated. M.G.L. c. 129 §14E.
5. All swine shall originate from qualified pseudorabies-free herds or herds in qualified pseudorabies-free states only.

Sheep Specific Information

See 9 CFR 79 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06

1. No sheep will be allowed entry from flocks in which Scrapie has been diagnosed or in which animals are under surveillance for Scrapie during the previous 18 months. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363-2290.
2. No sheep will be permitted entry from flocks in which soremouth has existed or in which soremouth vaccine had been administered in the previous sixty (60) days.
3. Sheep must be free from visual evidence of foot rot, soremouth, pinkeye, ringworm, and open or draining wounds.
4. While not required, is it strongly recommended that sheep be currently vaccinated against rabies.

Equine Specific Information

See M.G.L. c. 128 §§2C. 44. 330 CMR 16.05

1. All equines entering a Massachusetts (MA) fairground originating from both within or outside Massachusetts must be accompanied by a valid health certificate and have a record of negative EIA (Coggins) test within the last 12 months.
2. All equines must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: mange, ringworm, soring, strangles, and open or draining wounds.
3. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all equines be vaccinated for rabies, tetanus, EEE and NV within one year of the fair.

Dog and Cat Specific Information

See M.G.L. c. 129 §39G

1. All dogs and cats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: kennel cough, distemper, hepatitis, parvo, ringworm, and mange.
2. All dogs and cats must be accompanied by a valid or current vaccination certificate for rabies.

2026 NE Exhibition Health Certificate Rules

All species

- **Animals of all species susceptible to HPAI** are potentially subject to quarantine as ordered by the State Veterinarian if HPAI is detected on a premises where the animal is or was exhibited.
- **If HPAI is detected in cattle in any New England State**, the Agreement between the New England State Veterinarians to allow the use of a single, fair and show season OCVI for New England animals being exhibited in New England will be voided. All exhibited animals would need to be accompanied by an OCVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of being checked in at the show premises and/or other state import requirements.
- Best biosecurity practices for all species should be implemented.

Contact the state where animals will be exhibited for the latest updated information.

2026 Fair and Show New England Health Certificates

For the 2026 Show and Fair Season, domesticated animals from New England states (CT, ME, MA, NH, RI, and VT) may be exhibited at fairs and shows in New England throughout the fair and show season using a single Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) that meet the requirements outlined in this memo.

General Requirements (all NE states):

- A single OCVI from the animals' home state may be completed for travel to and from the New England states in which the animals will be exhibited.
- Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one OCVI with appropriate individual IDs and descriptions.
- Animals of different species may not be listed on the same official health certificate.
- An itinerary of the **names** and **locations** for each New England fair or show at which owner expects to show the listed animals and the **dates when each animal is expected to be on each site**, must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time the OCVI is written.
 - A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the OCVI (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show.
 - That proposed list should be **signed by the veterinarian and the owner/ exhibitor** and reference the relevant OCVI number(s).
 - Electronic OCVIs **must include this list of exhibition names, addresses, and dated in the "remarks and comments" section**
- The **first show or fair** where the listed animals will be exhibited will be the **Consignee** on the OCVI, as shown here:
 - New England Fair Season**
 - Street address of first fair or show
 - See Exhibition List

2026 NE Exhibition Health Certificate Rules

- Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were physically on show/fairgrounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check-in.
- **Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home.** Any animal that is **refused entry** to any exhibition during 2026 for health reasons must have a new OCVI issued by an accredited veterinarian **within 30 days** of the next fair or show where it will be exhibited.
- Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

State-specific requirements:

- **CT**
 - Fair and Show OCVIs may be issued and used between January 1 and October 31, 2026
 - An importation permit for exhibition animals is required for cattle, camelids, goats, sheep, and swine
 - Testing and vaccinations are required for some species
 - Contact CT Dept. of Agriculture for permits and requirements at 860-713-2504 or AGR.SVCS@ct.gov
- **MA**
 - Fair and Show OCVIs may be issued and used between January 1 through October 31, 2026
 - Contact MDAR at 857-348-3922 or 617-626-1795 with questions
- **ME**
 - Fair and Show OCVIs may be issued and used between January 1 and October 31, 2026
 - An importation permit for exhibition animals is required for some species

- **RI**
 - Fair and Show OCVIs may be used between January 1 and October 31, 2026
 - Contact the RI State Veterinarian's Office at 401-537-4281 with questions
- **NH**
 - Fair and show OCVIs may be issued on or after April 1, 2026, and used for participating NH fairs and shows from July 1 through October 31, 2026
 - Contact NH State Veterinarian's Office (603) 271-2404 for permits
- **VT:**
 - Fair and show OCVIs may be issued on or after April 1, 2026, and used for participating VT fairs and shows from May 1 through October 31, 2026
 - Contact the VT Animal Health Office at 802-828-2421 for specific import requirements and permits

Sick or exposed animals may not be shipped anywhere.

General Livestock Rules and Regulations

- 1. All Westport Fair and Massachusetts 2026 animal health regulations will apply.**
 - **The Commonwealth of Massachusetts strongly recommends rabies vaccination for livestock.**
 - All exhibitors must show health and ownership papers before animals may be unloaded.
 - Ownership must be in exhibitors name by June 1, 2026.
 - All animals will be checked for good health before unloading.
 - Animals disqualified for health reasons will be required to leave the fairgrounds immediately.

- 2. All livestock shows are Youth.**
 - Exhibitors must be 5 years of age as of January 1, 2026.
 - Ages for Showmanship classes and fitting classes are as follows:
 - Peewee- Ages 5-8 years old
 - Junior- Ages 9-12 years old
 - Intermediate- 13-16 years old
 - Senior- 17+ years old

 - For the safety of young exhibitors please chose age appropriate livestock, example: small children: small animals.

 - Westport Fair is a youth show. Parents and adults are to supervise, not perform the work involved in preparing livestock for the shows.

- 3. Entries are limited to space available; entries are accepted on a first come basis until space is filled.**
 - Mail all entries to show secretaries by July 12, 2026.
 - Make checks payable to Westport Fair.
 - See show rules for entry fees and secretary addresses.

- 4. Proper show dress is required. No sandals or flip-flops allowed in livestock area.**

- 5. No horned animals allowed for the safety of exhibitors, fairgoers, and other animals.**

- 6. Feed and hay must be provided by the exhibitor.**
 - There will be **no overnight exhibitors' camp.**
 - All reasonable precautions will be taken by the Westport Fair for the safekeeping of animals, but the Fair will not be held responsible for loss, damage or injury to exhibitors, animals or personal property from any cause.
 - Barn Crew will care for livestock when exhibitors are not at the fair.
 - Exhibitors are responsible for the feeding, watering, and pick-up while at the fair.

- 7. Judges' decisions are final.**
 - The Show Secretaries reserve the right to combine or omit classes as they see fit.

- 8. Parking will be provided for Livestock Trailers in a designated area only.**

 - b. Proper show dress is required- White shirt (long sleeve or short sleeve with a lab coat) and tan pants (if weather is over 85 degrees shorts are acceptable provided they are not short). No sandals or flip-flops.
 - c. All exhibitors must carry and groom their own animal.
2. An entry fee of \$1.00 per animal paid upon arrival.
3. Premiums of \$5, \$4, \$3, will be paid for all classes. Prizes will be awarded for top Fitting and Showmanship in each class.
4. Animals must arrive by 6:00 PM on Wednesday July 15, 2026 and stay until end of show.

- Additional winning may be earned if the class is sponsored. Sponsored classes will be announced prior to the start of the class.
- Winnings will be mailed directly to the address of the winner, provided at sign in, after the completion of the Westport Fair and all pulls.
- Winners have 90 days to cash said payout otherwise the award will be returned to the general funds of the Westport Fair.
- 12-16 Yrs Old 7000 lb Farm- 3mph will NOT be awarded a cash prize, a trophy will be presented to 1st place and ribbons for 2nd & 3rd place.

General Rules

- All drivers must sign a waiver form at time of entry.
- When the pull starts, the last driver in the first round completes his pull and closes the class. No new entries will be accepted.
- All drivers are entitled to 1 "pit person" for the farm stock classes and 2 "pit people" for all others, said pit person(s) must also sign the Westport Fair waiver form.
- When entering a class all contestants will draw for the first 10 positions upon signing into class, after the first 10 spots are filled the order will be determined by the next available position.
- Each tractor can only be entered once in an individual class
- Tractors and equipment must be deemed safe.
- All drivers must present a valid government issued driver's license at time of entry.
- Any driver or designated pit person under the age of 18 must have written legal permission from their parent or legal guardian
- If any driver is found falsifying said permission, the driver will be disqualified and suspended for the remainder of this year and the following pulling year of the Westport Fair.
- Alcohol use is not permissible.
- If a driver is found under the influence, they will automatically be disqualified.
- Tractors must have rubber tires, no four-wheel drives, no tire studs, and no chains permitted.

- Weights must be solid and safely secured. In-Securable weights will be grounds for disqualification. Any weight falling from tractors will cause disqualification of tractors.
- No portion of the tractor may interfere with the sled or sled hitch during a pull.
- Pulls will use a chain 48 inches in length.
- All tractors must be equipped with workable rear brakes.
- All tractors must be equipped with safety bars. Safety Bar Specifications are as follows:
 - The safety bar must be made of three-inch channel-iron or equivalent
 - The safety bars must be rigid and stationary and shall extend from the middle of the rear axle and past the rear tires, and not more than ten inches from the ground.
 - Hitch must accept a 6" hook at a maximum height of 20".
 - All safety bars must be equipped with safety pads on the ends of the bars.
 - The safety pads must be stationary and must not be less than 25 square inches per pad.
 - All tractors must be equipped with safety bars strong enough to support the weight of the tractor when tested by the judge.
 - No wheels are allowed for safety pads- they must be pads.
- Excessive loss of liquid by a tractor while in forward motion during a contest on the track will be cause for disqualification, unless due to internal breakage.
- The operator must remain seated during a pull.
- Nitrous oxide will not be allowed in any class.
- An attempt moving the sled is a measurable distance.
- All pulls made during a contest will be measured.
- The tractor must remain within the boundaries of the contest course during a pull out of boundaries and will be automatically disqualified.
- Floating finishes will be announced prior to the start of the round of the pull, which is based on the judge's discretion.
- The contest is to be governed by the judge(s) with all decisions final. Judge(s) have the right to stop and disqualify any tractor if it is not being operated in such a manner as would be considered safe.

Concrete Slab Rules

- All general rules will be followed.
- Length of pull will be 12 feet.
- A two-minute hitch time will be enforced. Clock will be stopped between hookups. At the judge's discretion, pull off clock time can be reduced to 1 minute 30 seconds. Clocks will be stopped between hookups.
- Hook must hang straight down. Twenty-inch height is measured where the pulling point clevis attaches to the drawbar or hitch point of clevis. A loose, swinging, or excessively worn drawbar will be disqualified.
- Boundaries will be provided on the edge of the slab. A tractor that crosses or touches boundaries will be disqualified.
- Breakdown before the first try, the tractor will go last in the round, after the second attempt if the tractor breaks down the tractor is disqualified.

- No bouncing in the seat will be allowed. The driver must remain seated. Movement by driver is limited to normal operation of the tractor. Violations will result in disqualification.

Weight Transfer Sled Rules

- All general rules will be followed.
- The hitch opening dimension must be 3" wide by 3-3/4" long and no higher than 20 inches on a weight transfer sled.
- Hitch must be easily accessible and remain cleared to be able to hook.
- Track is 300' in length, unless otherwise stated at the start of the pull. The track is 30' in width, and all boundaries shall be lined.
- Track will be maintained and packed to the best of the ability of the Westport Fair
- Number one puller will be the test puller, if after said pull the sled is considered "set," the puller may pull immediately after the test pull, or they may pull in last position. For stock farm tractors they will drop to third position. If a puller experiences mechanical problems during a test pull the puller will have the additional option of dropping to last position. If the transfer sled needs further adjustment, the first puller after each adjustment will be treated as the number one puller. All decisions on re-pulls caused by a contest malfunction, the puller, at his/her discretion, may drop to last positions. All disqualifications on the first attempt bars a second attempt. In a pull off, after the first tractor has made a legal pull, all remaining tractors must hook and pull at that weight.
- Pulls must start with a tight hitch; no jerking will be permitted. Contestants will be allowed two consecutive attempts and 75 feet to start the sled. Voluntary stop must be signaled by the operator to the Track Judge. Failure to do so constitutes an official pull.
- All pulls shall be operated with two flag persons. Number one flag person will be responsible for readiness of the track, pulling machine and contestant. The number two flag person will be responsible for the balance of the track.
- The flag person will be given a red flag to be used to stop a pull, the flag person may use this if they believe the contestant is violating a rule or is unsafe.
- Spark plug guards must be present for all tractors in the farm super stock, modified/homemade & twin-engine tractor pull classes. Spark plug guards can be checked by track officials at their discretion. Spark plug guards made from aluminum must be at least 1/4 inch thick. Spark plug guards made from steel must be at least 1/8 inch thick.
- A limit of 18.4" on tractor tire width for Farm Stock Tractors and a 30.5" width for all other classes.
- The use of torque converters, automatic shifts, etc. will be permitted.
- A kill switch is mandatory on all twin-engines, modifies, super stock, and homemade tractors. Proof of switch operation is mandatory.
- All non stock tractors such as, Twin Engines, Super Stock, Modified/Homemade, ect. must have a seat belt, and roll cages or T-Bars. They must be able to support the weight of the tractor. Roll cage wall thickness must be not less than 0.120 thick.
- T-Bar must be made of a thick wall box tub in.

Farm Stock Class

- All general rules will be followed.
- Stock Farm Tractors shall consist of the stock engine block as listed by the manufacturer with no visual modification: the stock bell housing, the stock transmission housing, and the stock final drive housing, all as listed by the manufacturer, standard R.P.M. only, no governor overrides and R.P.M. will be checked upon Driver Protest. Said Protest must be placed immediately after pulling the protested tractor.
- A tractor may only pull in one class with an mph designation per night.
- The driver must choose the MPH class at time of sign in. Driver may not change said class once chosen.
- If a MPH limit is set at the beginning of the pull, then the MPH limit is required by the time the designated marker on the track is passed

70/70 Pull

- Both the tractor and puller must be a minimum of 70 years old by December 31, 2026
- For this class only, a tractor may be used by multiple drivers meeting the age requirement.

12-16 Yrs Old

- All general rules will be followed.
- Parents or legal guardians will be required to state the age of the child including birth date.
- Children MUST be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian at all times while operating their tractors.
- The parent or legal guardian will be required to operate the tractor while in the pits and while hooking and unhooking the tractor to the transfer sled.
- The tractor is only be allowed to pull once during this class.

Super Stock Tractors

- All general rules will be followed.
- It may have a composite frame from the bell housing forward.
- Custom manifolds and intakes are allowed.
- All Super Stock Tractors may run on either gasoline or diesel fuel. Water-ethanol injection systems are allowed.
- Kill switches on all gas and diesel Super Stock tractors must be able to hook on sled.
- Engine side shields are mandatory and must be able to be removed if officials want to inspect the tractors.
- For driver's safety, fenders are required on Super Stock Tractors along with clutch and transmission shields or blankets installed.
- Stock Tractors may use custom built front ends.
- Drivers of Super Stock Tractors must wear approved Helmets and Fire Suits.

Modified/Homemade & Twin-Engine Modified Tractors

- All general rules will be followed.
- No four-wheel drive tractors allowed.
- Dual wheels are permitted with a max width of 30.5”.
- No portion of a modified tractor may exceed 16 feet forward of the center of the rear wheels.
- Modified Tractors are those using any combination of engine, transmission, and final drive. Engine used in automobile and trucks are acceptable
- Tractors within this class using the weight transfer sled will be required to have transmission protection in the form of a ¼ inch safety shield or a safety blanket.
- Fuel injection of any kind will be allowed.
- Helmets, eye protection, fire suits are required on all drivers within these classes
- For twin engine class must be naturally aspirated or single engine blower
- Homemade tractors will hitch the clevis no higher than 20 inches to the center pinhole.
- Fans will be shrouded with metal of 3/32 inches maximum
- All Turbochargers must be covered.
- Neutral safety switches must be working.
- Shafts will be shielded.
- Drive shaft shields 360 degrees will be required.
- Fuel systems may consist of multiple carburetors or fuel injection.

Street Semi-Truck

- All general rules will be followed.
- Trucks must meet state requirements for registration but do not require to be registered.
- EMPTY Dump trucks are permitted in said class and must provide a 16” hitch in order to pull.
- DOT Tires only
- No added weights
- Functional 5th wheel required, the Westport Fair will supply 5th wheel hitch
- 17 MPH Max is allowed

Super Street Diesel Pick Up

- All general rules will be followed.
- Kill switch and taped u-joint is required
- A 26” hitch is required, a 30” hitch is allowed for 2 wheel drive trucks only.

Hot Street Semi

- All general rules will be followed.
- DOT Tires only
- No added weights
- Functional 5th wheel required, the Westport Fair will supply 5th wheel hitch
- No dump truck is permitted.

Canning

- Entries must be presented in the past 12 months and must be made by exhibitor.
- Each entry shall be of the standard commercial canning jar size and type.
- All canned products including jam and jellies shall be sealed and by:
 - Processing
 - Boiling water bath for fruit and tomatoes
 - Steam pressure for vegetables and meats.
- Variety of classes to be those approved by the U.S.D.A. standards.
- Entries are to be dropped off at the office by the North Gate anytime on Wednesday evening.
- Please include a 3x5 index card with exhibitor's name.

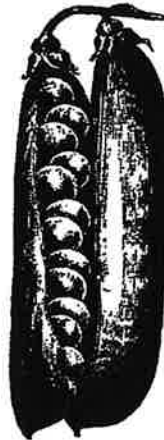
